stacy says: When you have many photos documenting a sequence of events, go with a linear design that stretches across two pages and arrange the photos in the order of how things happened. This will let the photos tell the story without the need for lots of journaling.

paige says: Gone are the days of deciding between the positive and the negative image. Use them both! A two-page spread is the perfect opportunity to embrace both halves of the die cut equation.



ien says: Creating a two-page spread is a great way to include both large and small photos. For this layout, I decided to use a large photo on the left side to draw the reader's eye to the title. On the right, I included two square photos along with my journaling and some embellishments.

DESIGN TIP: Seek a common connection.

Inspired by the clothing in the larger image, Jen opted for a cool palette of pinks and purples. She then used those shades to create a cohesive spread, proving the same exact paper isn't needed on both sides of a two-page spread to make a strong connection. The use of white further ties her darling design together. Have fun playing with pattern and thinking outside of the matching box.




sheri says: The beauty of working with two-page spreads is the added space available to tell your story, but it can sometimes seem overwhelming to fill such a large canvas. When I get stuck, I turn to a double-page pocket spread. The small, designated pockets of space can feel more approachable. Don't be afraid to shift from one style to another in your album.

DESIGN TIP: Mix and match pockets. One of the big advantages to using divided page protectors is choice! With the many design configurations available, you can display your words, images, and embellishments in any number of ways. And don't feel locked in to using mirror images. Mix and match your pocket schemes, or go with a traditional page on one side of your layout and pockets on the other. No matter the pair you pick, pockets are a fun way to dive into doubles!





marla says: When designing a two-page spread, I use painter's tape on the back to attach the two base layers together. This literal connection helps me see and treat the canvas as one big layout. I'm then able to pull the design elements across both pages to create one piece of artwork, instead of two separate layouts.

DESIGN TIP: Use your phone.

Looking for an easy way to create 3 x 4 photos to include in pocket scrapbooking pages? The answer is at your fingertips. Smart device applications, such as PicStitch and the Project Life App, offer a photo collage option, including the placement of two 3 x 4 images side by side. You can then print the images as you would any 4 x 6 print, cut it in half, and get to scrapping.
