
design your story

WHAT ARE YOUR FAVES? The story of your favourites is all about the small details.

Fall is my favourite season, and a quick flip through my phone's photos gave me a host of shots to create my grid.

DESIGN TIP: Masculine or feminine? I used fun papers from Close To My Heart that were a bit more masculine in their feel (and theme!), but I thought they worked great for fall. Don't limit yourself to palettes that lean one way or the other. Use what makes you happy and what works with your story!

DESIGN TIP: Set some product

limits. I chose only three patterned papers for this layout. I like to set limits when I create because it keeps me from getting overwhelmed by my products, and it also helps me to stretch my supplies further!

DESIGN TIP: Neutral is good.

How often do you create with only a neutral palette? I love how these papers are all kraft and tan tones and how well they work with my photo. If patterned paper trips you up, look for the neutrals in your collection and start from there!

DESIGN TIP: What can

you repeat? Repeating embellishments is a great way to create a unified design. Notice how each of my wooden hearts features a bit of baker's twine. My journaling spot also has a little length of twine in the design which I thought was a fun bonus bit of repetition for the page.
