YOUR STORY TODAY

Focus on the here and now.

This year, Victoria turned the big 4-0. She could have documented her life in retrospect, but instead she chose to focus on who she is right now in this moment. Telling your story in all of its glorious detail can be such a wonderful way to capture real life.

DESIGN TIP: Make a list! If you struggle with journal writing or if you're looking for another way to approach documenting your stories, consider making a list of highlights. Dates, facts, quotes, and personal "I" statements are great options for journaling.

DESIGN TIP: Create a focal

point. If you are looking to add a punch to your layouts, consider creating a main focal point. Victoria created a layered cluster of florals that draw the eye into the layout with the story and photo anchored below.

STORY TIP: State the facts.

If lengthy prose is not your thing, focus on simple facts. Share basic details about your subject such as their preferences, activities, interests, or actions. This information makes for simple yet effective storytelling.

DESIGN TIP: Break up your journaling. Create small blocks of text that can be positioned around your layout. Victoria created a small grid under her photo that holds the journaling and other decorative embellishments

DESIGN TIP: Go small. The size and style of this layout is the perfect canvas for smaller embellishments. These tiny icons are a great finishing touch and add a lot of dimension and texture to the overall composition. It's a great way to put your crafty stash to work!
