PAIGE'S STARTING POINT: **Embellishments**

New products are always so fun so why not use an entire package on one layout? Paige used all but two of the chipboard circles from her Blooming Wild collection to create a dramatically darling diagonal of patterned and icon spots along the left side of her layout. These embellishments became the main design element, and the photos on the right give the layout a pleasing sense of balance.

DESIGN TIP: Repeating elements on a layout or card gives the design a feeling of beautiful abundance.

MINDY'S STARTING POINT: Ink blending Creating the perfect blend of ink can be a terrific

starting point. Mindy wanted to create an underwater scene, so she picked out a stencil and ink blended with colours that would work well together for that idea. Mindy quips, "For me, the blend decides the card so after ink blending, I changed my mind and instead of creating an underwater scene, I simplified it by adding a layering die cut flower, sentiment, and a panel to anchor it all to the center of the card."

DESIGN TIP: For the best results with ink blending, invest in good cardstock and blending brushes!

DILAY'S STARTING POINT: Embossing folders Make embossing the star of the show. Before embossing this card panel, Dilay stamped circles in various sizes and colours on a plain white A2-sized piece of cardstock. The impression of the leaves popped up the white panel as well as the circles for a continuous design.

DESIGN TIP: Misting the back of your cardstock

with a small amount of water helps soften the fibers to prevent cracking. In addition, the softened fibers can provide an even deeper design.

DESIGN TIP: The rule of thirds RULES! Check out how this layout by Jess takes your eye through the design with three pockets that include words.

DESIGN TIP: Format your text to be centered and play with the design of your journaling. Notice how the words themselves create a very definite design.

DESIGN TIP: Take inspiration from graphic design in ads, commercials, and magazines. The Story followed by details • thoughts • observations looks like a chic and modern editorial design.

JESS'S STARTING POINT: A story Sometimes your photos will only tell part of the story

In this instance, she wanted to share some fun details in her journaling, including the amazing story behind her son's hole in one at the mini golf course. This story was a great starting point for creating a travel layout.

LISA'S STARTING POINT: A cut file

Get started with a cut file. Cut files are often designed to be the focus or title of a layout, so they can be a great way to get your mojo going. Lisa's GORGEOUS cut file really suits the pretty Simple Stories patterned papers and is oh-so-fitting for a feminine Mother's Day layout.

DESIGN TIP: Use a wreath-shaped cut file to anchor the title, journaling, and photos in your layout.

DESIGN TIP: Give your photos more heft with a patterned paper "frame."
