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





pic tips

Basic tips for the best back to school shots. BY SHERI REGULY

Back-to-school photos are some of my favourites. I love capturing the anticipation in my children's faces as another year begins. To keep the photos of your kids feeling as a fresh as a box of newly sharpened #2 pencils, I have tips for every age. So let's take those pics to the head of the class.



TIP: If you don't happen to get A+ photos on the first day of school, snap a few more throughout the first week. Or embrace the real-life imperfections as they are. Sometimes it's these candids that make for the best and most memorable stories.

Tips for the Early Years

- 1 Take your shots before that first school bell rings. If you wait until they come home, they'll likely have punch on their first-day shirt and hair pointing every which way.
- 2 Consider reoccurring ideas to show progression. Maybe it's asking your child to hold a chalkboard with grade-specific details on it or a common photo spot used year to year. Start these themes while they're young.
- 3 Illustrate their age with youthful props. Get a close-up of their tiny hands wrapped around large crayons. Take a shot of them stepping on the school bus, complete with an oversized backpack.

Tips for Tweens & Teens

- 1 Take a trip to school on an off day to get that cool on-campus shot without being spotted by peers (because... Moooom, how embarrassing!).
- 2 Incorporate props at home. Something as basic as an apple, books, or a class schedule will quickly create classroom ambiance.
- 3 Encourage them to take selfies throughout the day. Life through their eyes will make for extra special pages in your album.



pocket play

From mundane to memorable—pocket documenting creates a unique life collective. BY MELANIE BLACKBURN

Pocket pages are one of my favourite ways to document life. Keeping weekly recaps is a wonderful and easy way to record your family's history. Divided page protectors are an excellent option for photo-filled events too holidays, birthdays, etc. Whether it's a big occassion or the smallest detail, the pieces in your pockets will evoke feelings of joy when reflected upon later.



today is the day

Fall is full of wonderful activities and photo ops. But I'll admit that capturing and celebrating each event in your scrapbooks can feel scary! Here's a trick: don't feel obligated to include everything. I know, this sort of goes against our scrapbooking nature, but there is a time and a place for self-editing, and now's the time. Rather than fill pocket after pocket, page after page, with Halloween shots, seek out a few sweet favourites and cover the remaining details in your journaling. Or zoom in on a theme within your theme, as I have here with the costume component of our Halloween fun.

TIPS

POCKET TIP #1: It's Halloween, which means kids are on the move! Include a blurry or in-motion picture to showcase that action as it's happening.

POCKET TIP #2: For picture-heavy events, use a single journaling card to recap your story so there's more space for images. If your handwriting is large, consider using a typewriter.

POCKET TIP #3: If you've narrowed down your theme to a single aspect and now find yourself a photo or two shy of the pockets you have to fill, look at adding detail shots. My chair image almost acts as an added journaling card. It's clean and simple and balances well against the card in the upper left corner. And yet it's a sneaky way to add in just a bit more detail.



When creating a pocket page, think cohesion.

There are ways to achieve harmony, even when your story stretches from theme to theme, in a single layout. Try creating a layout with a common pocket occurrence or a coordinating colour scheme. Journaling cards and embellishments in a similar palette will pull your look together, no matter the topics being discussed. And strategic placement of your colour components will create flow throughout your design. Notice how the rust and yellow hues each appear in three places on my Thanksgiving Camping page. These triads work to subtly guide the eye.

rise & shine

TIPS

POCKET TIP #1: Don't be afraid to journal directly on your pictures, either with a typewriter (as I did in my spread) or with your handwriting. (Turn to page 51 to see a hand-written example from Ali Edwards.)

POCKET TIP #2: When a spread features a darker colour palette, drop in white cards to lighten the look.

POCKET TIP #3: Trim those leftovers! No, I'm not talking turkey. As you finish a traditional paper project, cut any leftover paper scraps to common pocket sizes $(3 \times 4, 4 \times 4, 4 \times 6, etc.)$ and save them for future pocket page projects.

The trend we're digging into today proves yet again that everything old can come back in a new way. Let's talk tassels! These stringed things, hip in the 70s, have made a comeback. They've been spotted on shoes, dangling from bracelets, and added to earrings. In the home, they add texture to throw pillows and linens. You'll find there's no hassle in the tassel. You'll simply need a few basic supplies to create your own. Let's make some dangling darlings together.

TECHNIQUE: Tassel Garland

Group a bunch of tassels together for a modern twist on a basic banner. For added interest, incorporate different tassel textures. Some of mine are pre-made leather embellishments. Others are made from paper. (To make your own paper version, cut a fringed border strip and roll it up.) Like a pile of fall leaves, the various colours and finishes make a pretty scene.

TECHNIQUE: Tassel Broom

Turn a tassel on its side and you've got yourself a broom in the making. All you need is a cardstock broomstick to complete your design. I embossed and die cut the tassel from Sizzix's cool leather paper, which adds awesome texture. And their new tassel die certainly sweeps me off my feet.

TECHNIQUE: DIY Tassels

With a little twine and time, you can create darling embellishments. These tassel treasures are ideal for everything from graduation cards (just use the grad's school colours) to festive Christmas tree decorations.

STEP ONE:

Trim a rigid card to the desired length of tassel. Leaving a length of twine for the tassels hanger, begin wrapping the twine around the card.



STEP TWO:

Slide the looped twine off the card. Wrap a piece of twine around the top third and glue in place.

TIP: Hot glue or a strong liquid adhesive will work well.



STEP THREE:

Trim the bottom of the wrapped bundle to create the tassel shape.

TIP: Tie the leftover twine at the top into a loop. This makes threading the tassel onto things a breeze.



Stack the numbers in your favour and create lift and texture. Every number on Laura's page is actually three numbers stacked together. Two are cut from chipboard and the third from patterned paper. The stack is then embossed and sanded.

STEP THREE: Apply paint to a smooth work surface, spray with water so colours blend, and drag textured pieces through wet paint.



STEP FOUR: Once dry, die cut numbers.

shape shifter

Don't feel locked into the accent elements presented in a sketch. They're simply meant to act as placeholders and offer design possibilities. So shift those shapes, straighten those scallops, and even adjust embellishment placement. Take Amy's first card, for example. The large circle accent gets replaced by a leaf. In gorgeous card #2, the circle element returns but has gone from center stage to the upper left corner and from prime focus to a background piece. Connecting the dots from the original sketch to Amy's designs is easy to do, but the adjustments made go to show how versatile this creative tool is.

······ GETTING STARTED

When making a mini album, it can be helpful to gather all of your supplies first. With your chosen paper and embellishments out in front of you, it's easier to plan the overall design ahead of time rather than trying to figure it out as you go. Plus it makes the process go much faster when you have everything at your fingertips.

MAKE IT TIP: Time after time.

Create a mini album showcasing a series of photos of the same person, people, or event spanning a number of years. It's fun to look through the pages and see the transformation and growth over time.

MAKE IT TIP: Go beyond the page. Use bold, colourful embellishments that look good from both sides. Let them extend slightly over the edge of the pages so they provide a little extra sumpin' sumpin' when viewing the book as a whole.



MAKE IT TIP: Include unifying elements. Mini albums are often more visually interesting when you incorporate a mix of different products. To tie everything together, use a unifying shape or accent throughout the pages, like circles or your favorite type of embellishment.



MAKE IT TIP: Maximize the tactile appeal.

Unlike regular scrapbook pages that are tucked away in a page protector, mini albums invite you to reach out and touch them. Adding a variety of textures like felt, lace, metal, and wood enhance the touchy-feely allure.

Get a jump on your holiday cards.

There's a special magic about the holidays that is undeniable. We come together in love and celebration as wishes of good cheer are sent across the miles. But even as card makers, making a high volume of cards to send to all of our cherished recipients isn't always easy. Don't let that overwhelm you. I have ideas that, while technique-driven, are still manageable, even when made in bulk, to keep your spirits bright.

FAUX BANNER

Create a faux banner around your photo with this layering trick.

- Make card from cardstock.
- 2 Stamp sentiment on cardstock strip using embossing ink, apply embossing powder, and set using a heat tool.
- 3 Adhere stamped piece to photo and add notched ends following step-outs on page 39.
- Mat photo with cardstock and adhere to card.
- 5 Die cut flowers from cardstock and adhere. Accent with glitter glue.

- 3 Trim thin strips from white and blue cardstock and adhere to glittered pocket.
- 4 Die cut "blessed" from cardstock and adhere. Stamp "Christmas."
- Insert photos in pocket.

- 1 Make card from cardstock; adhere photo.
- 2 Stamp flower and sentiment on vellum panel; emboss. NOTE: Before stamping, review step-outs on page 39 for a tip that makes combining multiple stamps easier.
- 3 Layer vellum piece over photo and machine-stitch along left edge to secure in place.
- 4 Adhere gems to flower.

CARD 1 HOW-TO




STEP ONE: Trim two 1 x 2 pieces from red cardstock. Notch ("v" cut) one side of each piece.



STEP TWO: Adhere pieces to back of photo, aligning just below the red strip to make it appear as if a single red strip has been wrapped around the image.

CARD 2 HOW-TO



STEP ONE: Trim glittered cardstock to desired card width. Die cut top edge using a border die.



STEP TWO: Apply strong adhesive to the bottom and side edges (not top) and adhere piece to card base.

CARD 3 HOW-TO



STEP ONE: Position stamps (smooth side up) on vellum piece where you want them to be. TIP: For added help aligning images on your photo, place the image beneath the vellum before positioning stamps.



STEP TWO: Press large acrylic block into stamps to secure them in place. Now you can apply ink and stamp without your images getting misaligned.







TIP: Include a mixture of photo types—a dash of detail (food close-ups, etc.) and a helping of the bigger picture (shots of scenes). The combo adds depth to the overall story. One of the stories that's important to me is my son's eating habits. Over the years he's gone from eating a very limited diet to loosening his restrictions to include a variety of foods. To document this journey, I've filled divided page protectors with photos from the last year. My journaling covers facts (a list of his favourite foods) and feelings (my personal high-fives to him). I love how divided page protectors work with stories that are centered around a specific theme. Chronological or not, the pockets represent unique chapters in our storybook of life.

IDEAS TO NOTE

- 1 Don't be afraid to write on pictures. Make it fun by seeking interesting open space, such as the muffin tin in my photo above.
- 2 Use embellishments with space for words (tabs, label stickers, etc.). They're just right for photo captions and added detail.
- 3 Create variety between detail shots and larger views by changing your photo perspective. In this example, my details are all shot directly overhead, while my scenic shots are typically taken straight on and from a distance.

Another story-telling angle to consider is a foodrelated experience that connects your childhood to today. Are there things you ate as a kid that you still enjoy? What food-related traditions have you maintained? Maybe it's more about a specific way something is prepared or how you gather around to eat it. If possible, combine photos from the past with photos from today. These kinds of stories form the fabric of our lives.

IDEAS TO NOTE

- Keeping with the food theme, think of your scrapbook page components as items on a menu. Looking at my page, it's clear my photos are the main course (i.e. the most prominent), while my journaling is a hearty side dish, and my embellishments a light dessert. The sizes vary, creating a balanced diet design.
- 2 Like setting a table for four, it's fun to think of your layout's foundation in four equal parts. On a 12 x 12 page, it ends up being four 6 x 6 squares that you can build from.
- The secret sauce is repetition. Place groups of similar embellishments in various places throughout your design to create harmony.

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




design your life

Playing with size is a surefire way to create layouts with visual punch. BY CATHY ZIELSKE

The principle of contrast (also called dominance or emphasis) is one way to make a big impact on any design. Making some things big and other things small energizes your project. It's also a great way to tell the eye where to look first. Whether you're emphasizing a page title or a focal photo, contrast will help you succeed every time.




layout 1

SIZE MATTERS

Pairing big words with smaller ones is one of my favourite ways to manipulate size on a layout. It creates drama, which in design creates interest and helps the page stand out as unique and engaging.

Here, I used my electronic die cutter to create the first oversized word for my page title. It immediately grabs your attention and directs the flow of the page. You follow the hierarchy down the layout, ending with another key player—the large photo. One goal of design is to help the viewer follow the story in a logical progression. There's no question where the starting point is here.

TIP: With a favourite font and an electronic die cutter, you can create any size letters you dream up. So go ahead and dream BIG!





I command you to look HERE! There is nothing I love more than a big photo on a layout. I make a lot of sports pages for my teenage son and a dominant focal photo makes my heart skip a beat every time. When did that little boy become a young man? If you have a shot you love, blow it up! Splurge on a full page enlargement (they're really quite affordable!) and make it the star of any two-page spread.

DESIGNER TIP: Display type is a category of type designed to capture attention by virtue of its unique design. Display type, such as Blackout Midnight, the font used for the "ultimate" title, tends to work best in smaller amounts. Think of it as a great option for page titles but not for journaling blocks. Used sparingly, this font category can really add to the theme of any design.





TIP: Big focal points are great attention grabbers, but it's the little details that make the page. Always look for an element or theme to repeat on your layout. Here, I use digital epoxy stars and patterns on each side of the spread to create a visual link between the two sides.

Time for some thankful giving—cards to make and give.

Fall is the perfect season to create handmade notes of thanks for those near and dear to your heart. With the variety of gratitude-centered products available this time of year and a few of my helpful hints, you'll be able to make a bundle of cards in a snap!

card 1

- 1 Make a 3¾ x 5¼ card base from cardstock; round right corners. Trim patterned paper to fit card front, round right corners, and adhere to card.
- 2 Trim journaling card from patterned paper and adhere to card with dimensional adhesive.
- 3 Stamp sentiment on die cut banner and adhere to card. Embellish with button tied with twine.
- 4 Adhere sticker to card and embellish with chipboard leaves and pumpkin.

TIP: If you love patterned paper like I do, use it as the base of your card and layer on more subtle papers. This gives you pattern while keeping your card crisp and clean.

- 3 Adhere owl, pumpkin, and leaves using dimensional adhesive. Adhere heart. Embellish with enamel dots.
- 4 Add sentiment sticker to card with dimensional adhesive. Attach "grateful" tab above chipboard frame.

TIP: Play the frame game. You don't have to work with photos to make the most of frames. The chipboard version used here works to group the various pieces together in a lovely, unified fashion.

- 5 Die cut stamped images and adhere to card using dimensional adhesive. Adhere sequins.

TIP: Make colouring inside the lines easy. Heat embossing a line-art image, such as the Fall motifs here, creates pockets of space that are easy to fill in using paint or markers.





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
